INSTITUTE'S PHILOSOPHY

The Obafemi's Story



Findings

- 73% of families in the engaged schools are dual income families
- Stress occasioned by work-family conflicts relates negatively (and quite strongly) on child performance.
- Children were more likely to be in poorer health, on the average when compared with their peers.
- Children with less parental involvement, were more likely to have behavioral problems.

Today, Nigeria has one of the highest number of out of school children, estimated by the United Nations to be 10.5 million (UN special report, 2012)

- There is Quality Gap in the Educational systems
- 26% pass WAEC between 2006 - 2015
- Nigerian universities conduct post UME exams to improve standards and schools in the UK make students go through the mandatory preparatory classes

Parents are the first teachers


Parental Involvement

- When parents are engaged in their children's schooling, students get better grades,
- Score higher on standardized tests
- Have better attendance records, drop out less often, have higher career aspiration
- Hold more positive attitudes toward school and homework
